Camp Dodge Roundup

In August 1931, eighty horses escaped from Camp Dodge and one hundred soldiers, aided by police, were sent to recover them. The horses fled after a blaze broke out in the stable used by Troop E and quickly spread to the stable used by Troop F. Every cavalryman in the camp was called out and a bucket brigade was formed. Before the Des Moines fire department could arrive the fire was under control.

When the fire was first discovered, 411 horses were placed in a corral near the stables. While the men were busy fighting the fire 150 of these horses escaped the corral and 80 actually left the camp. Phone calls came in from all of the city the next morning reporting the stray horses. Nine horses were found at 21st and Prospect Road, three more were picked up on the Drake University

campus and four were located in east Des Moines in the area of East 14th and Morton. As soon as calls were received, soldiers were driven in police cars to places where the horses had been reported. The soldiers then captured them and rode them back to Camp Dodge.

Otto's Conoco

A Johnston Landmark for Over 50 Years

Otto's Conoco gas station was opened on Thanksgiving Day in 1922 by Arlie Otto. The station was originally a Deep Rock station but switched to Conoco in 1956.

The station opened on Merle Hay Road just five years after the road was built in 1917. At that time there was only one other gas station between Camp Dodge and Des Moines.

In 1937 Arlie Otto's son, Don, took over running the station. The original station was remodeled and enlarged several times. The number of service bays was expanded to three and the number of pumps to six.

The Conoco station was closed in October, 1980 and was purchased by Pioneer Seed Corn Company. The Bishop Drumm Care Center now stands on its former location.


Obituaries


