She must.*

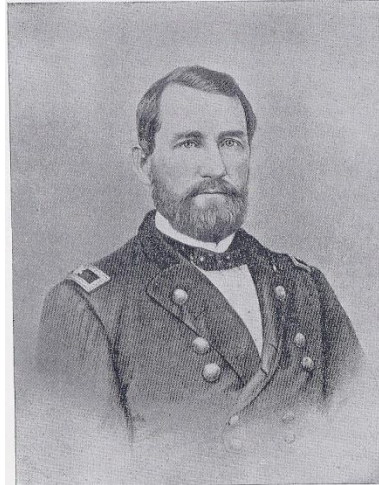
*It is time to tell the world about Her

A Civil War General and an Iowa Statesman Played Roles in the History of Johnston

The General



General James Madison Tuttle

General James Madison Tuttle commanded the Iowa Brigade during the Civil War on the battlefield at Shiloh. His brigade was known as the “Hornet’s Nest” because of their strong resistance to the Confederate forces.

General Tuttle returned to civilian life in September 1864 and moved his family to Des Moines. Between 1864 and 1866 he bought small parcels of land in what is now Johnston until he had accumulated nearly 1200 acres. Some familiar family names selling land to General Tuttle were John and Marie Betz, Simon Casady, and Theobald and Louisa Schlenker.

Today this land is bordered approximately by Merle Hay Road on the east, 180/35 on the south, Beaver Creek on the west, and the Johnston Library and Johnston Historical Museum on the north.

General Tuttle never lived on the land, but he farmed it and raised hogs. These hogs were processed in his pork packing business which was established in Des Moines in 1869. This was the same year he sold the land to Moses Robinson.

The Honorable Moses W. Robinson served the State of Iowa as a legislator and a member of the Constitutional Convention which drafted the second Iowa Constitution. In 1869 Moses moved his family from the Burlington area to the Des Moines area and bought the Tuttle farm. He built a home on this land which was located where the Weatherspoon home once stood and more recently the location of the Irwin Bike Shop. The land became known as Robinson's Ranch.

The 1870 census of Walnut Township (now Webster) lists Moses living with his family and 19 farmhands. These farmhands were of diverse backgrounds with listed birth places that included Canada, Denmark, Prussia, New York, Tennessee, Sweden, Michigan, Ohio, Wisconsin, Norway and Pennsylvania. Moses died at his home in 1882.

Moses and his wife are buried in McDivitt Grove cemetery in Urbandale.

City News

The city of Johnston is considering the need for a new Public Safety facility and second fire station. Due to Johnston's growth more homes and buildings are farther away from the existing fire station than is recommended by the National Fire Prevention Association, thus increasing the emergency response time. Response times are also lengthened because firefighters are housed in a building located near the fire station that was once used as a temporary classroom building.

The Johnston Police Department is also in serious need of additional space. The current police station is housed in city hall, a remodeled former grocery store. Police currently work in cramped and non-secure working conditions.

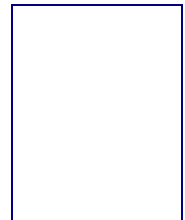
Mark Your Calendars
