#### **Garlock Orchard**

Ephraim and Laura (Bauman) Garlock moved into a home in 1928 along Beaver Drive where they had a large apple orchard with many varieties of apples. In 1941 the orchard was damaged by an early freeze. They again planted a large apple orchard on the Bauman homestead along NW 86<sup>th</sup> Street and 70<sup>th</sup> Avenue. This area was inherited from Laura's parents John and Mary (Friar) Bauman at their passing. started the Friar Mary's parents School that closed along with three other schools to start the Johnston Consolidated School System. Laura and Ephraim had four sons: William, Henry, Donald and Robert. The house that was on the property located at NW 86<sup>th</sup> Street and NW 70<sup>th</sup> Ave. is now used as the Johnston Historical Museum.

# **Blizzard of 2009**

A record December snowfall brought the total for the month in Johnston to 28.52 inches. This amount breaks the all time Johnston record for December snowfall which was previously 26.9 inches set in 2000. The 28.52 inch total is the second highest calendar month snowfall on record for Johnston, behind only January 1886 with 37.0 inches. The most snow received in one day was on December 8<sup>th</sup> with 16 inches.

#### **Johnston City News**

The Johnston Fire Department is now a combination department. The department has both paid on call and full time staffing. Current staffing consists of a fulltime chief and 6 fulltime firefighter/ EMT's. Fulltime crews work 12 hour shifts 7 days a week. Paid on call members respond to calls in the evenings. A sleep in program has been established, putting 3 part time firefighters, EMT's, and paramedics in house throughout the night. With the projected city growth the Johnston Fire Department may add more full time positions.

#### Johnston's New Police Chief Bill Vaughn

"I am excited about the opportunity to serve as the City of Johnston's police chief where the department and its staff are dedicated professionals. Chief Nichols has done an excellent job of managing the department and leaves a wonderful foundation for me to build on," states Bill Vaughn, who was recently named the police chief for the City of Johnston. As he steps into his position as chief, he has set some priorities for the upcoming months; getting to know the staff and community, and building upon the department's community policing initiatives. As Vaughn takes over the reins as chief, he will be working to increase police presence as merited by the needs of the community.

#### **Human Statue of Liberty**

Eighteen thousand soldiers of the Camp Dodge 163<sup>rd</sup> Depot Brigade formed the silhouette of the Statue of Liberty for the renowned photograph shot by Chicago, photographers Mole and Thomas on August 22<sup>nd</sup> 1918. The design for the living picture was laid out on the drill ground of Camp Dodge west of current building S34 and Maintenance Road.

In Preparation for the photograph the ground was marked out by blocks in the shape of the statue. This facilitated getting soldiers into the correct formation. The various folds of the gown, the Bible, the left hand, and the crown were properly outlined by soldiers wearing white shirts.

Beginning at 1:00 p.m. companies were assembled and by 2:30 p.m. the proper formation was completed and the photograph taken. The picture was taken from a tower forty feet high, constructed for the occasion, using an 11" by 14" view camera. On account of the mass formation and the heat twelve men fainted and were carried from the field. The high temperature reported for the day was 92 degrees.

The photograph was made into a poster. A copy of this poster is on display in the Johnson Historical Society Museum as well as the Gold Star Museum at Camp Dodge.
