Current School News Johnston High School Girls Softball Team

We congratulate the Johnston High School girls' softball team for representing our town and school in the recent Class 5A state softball tournament. The top-ranked Johnston Dragons (37-3) scored nine runs in the first four innings to beat CIML rival Southeast Polk 10-2 at Rogers Sports Complex in Fort Dodge on Friday, July 25, 2014. This year they took home the first place trophy. Last year they came in second losing to Dowling Catholic.

Brooke Wilmes hit a second-inning grand slam, drove in five runs and scored four times Friday night. She was named captain of the all-tournament team. Also named to that team were Johnston's Addy Pender and Brooke Sandstone.

Johnston also won the state title in 2009.

Three Generations of William F. Peterson Family attended Johnston Schools

As we celebrate Johnston School's Centennial this year, it seems appropriate to write an article on a family from Johnston that touched many people over the years through their involvement with the Johnston School and community.

William F. Peterson, born in 1910, was raised in Johnston, Iowa and attended Johnston School. His sister, Betty (Peterson) Fisher, born in 1912 also attended Johnston and was named salutatorian of the class of 1929. William, better known as Bill was from the class of 1928, the first class to have a school annual, then called the *Blue and Gold*. These two graduates were just the beginning of an entire family to graduate from Johnston.

William, whom I will refer to as Bill in the remainder of the story, met the love of his life, Irma Richardson who would graduate with the

class of 1931. They married after Irma graduated and from this union, three children were born: William J. Peterson graduated in 1952, Elizabeth A. Peterson graduated in 1955, and Robert Michael Peterson graduated in 1971.

William J. (Billy) Peterson married Barb Wagner and they had two children, a boy named William and girl named Rebecca. Billy began his career at Western Electric and later transferred to Denver, CO where he remained the rest of his life. Billy passed away in 2009.

Elizabeth (Liz), married Richard McCarl and from that union a son was born, Richard V. McCarl. He would become the third generation to graduate from Johnston in 1975. Liz and Richard currently live in Johnston.

The youngest of Bill and Irma's children, was Robert Michael Peterson, known as Mike, was married and had a daughter Christen. Mike lived in Johnston before passing away in April, 2014.

Bill was popular in high school, and was quoted in his senior high school annual as saying his favorite pastime was taking freshman girls out in his Ford. One of those freshman girls, must have been the pretty Irma Richardson.

Bill was found in a picture of students that represented Johnston at the Dairy Congress in Waterloo, he was captain of his football team playing the quarterback position, played baseball and basketball. Irma was in the Home Making class and played basketball.

Bill was in the National Guard while in high school. After school, he went to work for the Johnston School, but quit to join the Army, where he would serve in WWII, serving overseas for 23 months, much of that time in Germany. He became the first soldier to ever receive two purple hearts for the same injury. Bill spent a year in the hospital in England and was not expected to live, so the Army sent the first purple heart to his wife Irma. Private Bill Peterson also received two stars for his injuries sustained in battle. Fortunately he did survive and received another purple heart when he was honorably discharged from the Army.

Upon his return to civilian life, Mr. Charles Varner, Superintendent of Johnston School asked him to come back to his job as custodian of the school. In those days, Bill would become the person maintaining the boiler system, electrical work, and plumbing plus general custodian duties. He also worked as a bus driver with a regular route plus drove for special trips such as music and athletic events.

He became an integral part of the school system. At that time there was one building so all staff and teachers interacted and were a close-knit community in itself. Bill had a unique dry sense of humor that was enjoyed by all who knew him. In an article written about Bill in the 1969 annual, it said, "He was the type of person who, when the occasion called for action, would discipline students, supply an endless stream of stories, rescue a kitten from the building rooftop, threaten to lock the boiler room if students and teachers did not behave and offered kindness and understanding to everyone who needed it."

In his spare time he enjoyed hunting and fishing and in later years became involved in Little League, coaching the team that no one else wanted. He had multiple crafts and even helped with the concrete work when the Johnston Federated Church was built. At one time, he was a Johnston Constable for the Sheriff's office. This was long before Johnston became a city so we were under the Polk County Sheriff's jurisdiction for law enforcement. His daughter, Liz, said he was known for his soft heart and was unable to enforce the reason for stopping those individuals, as he was everyone's friend. Bill passed away in 1969 at the age of 59.

Irma raised three children, worked in the kitchen at the school and later worked and retired as a secretary for Pioneer Hi-Bred Co. Irma passed away in 1992 at the age of 79.

It has been my pleasure and joy to write about this Johnston family that I knew personally growing up in Johnston. Although they are not the only family that has graduated three generations, it is unique.

As I mentioned earlier, 1928, the year Bill graduated was the first year for an annual, named the *Blue and Gold*, so it is quite significant in the school's history. The Peterson family has donated an original copy of this historical book. We thank them for this treasured piece of school history that we have placed in the Johnston Historical Museum.
