The following news items were taken from *The Community Review* published semi-monthly by the Johnston Consolidated School:

Wednesday morning, February 6th, J.W. Hunt's bus collided with the car driven by Theodore Rittgers on Beaver Avenue. The ruts were so deep in the road that neither car could get out of the track. However, no damage was done to either car.

The bus that hauls the children to Saylor Center School was delayed several times Tuesday while the driver dug the bus out of snow drifts.

The Ankeny mail carrier could not carry the mail for two days because of the deep snow.

Stephen Lundstrom broke one bone of his wrist and threw the other bone out of place while cranking his Ford on February 10th.

Luther Holcomb's have installed a radio.

Meredith's garage burned down Monday morning, January 21. The cause was unknown.

Charles Rittgers put up ice Wednesday and Thursday, January 23 and 24.

Johnston to Consider Two High Schools

A committee has been formed to explore whether adding an additional high school is the best way to handle future growth in the Johnston School District. Opening a second high school by the year 2015-2016 would put an estimated 788 students in each building with enrollment serving grades 10 - 12.

Also being considered is converting the current middle school and high school buildings into one 9 - 12 building capable of serving 2,500 students. This option would necessitate building a new middle school.
