## The Mott's

Dick Mott was born on May 11, 1928 to parents, Lee Everett and Fern Hazel Mott. Lee was a farmer in Scotch Ridge, Iowa, an area between Indianola and Des Moines. While living in the Scotch Ridge area, Dick had gone to a two-room school, one room housed 1-4 grades, the other 5-8. After Dick's father was killed in a farm accident in the summer of 1936, his mother moved the three children, Charles, Dick and Betty, along with her parents, Art and Ida Toepfer to Johnston.

His grandparents bought a 60 acre farm for \$9,000. The farm was located west of Beaver and south of NW 62nd Ave, (then called Johnston Road). The land which surrounds the Kinsey Cemetery was once part of the farm. Johnston Road was a two-lane dirt road when they moved into their large, square 4 bedroom farmhouse on March 1, 1937. Dick was only 8 years old at the time.

Johnston became home to the Mott family. His siblings, Charles Mott married Eva and they had three children. Betty Mott married Orié Reed and they had two children. All three siblings raised their children in Johnston, however, Chuck and family eventually moved to Milo, Iowa where his wife, Eva still lives today.

Dick began school in Johnston when he was in the 4<sup>th</sup> grade. Johnston had 13 grades. He had not attended kindergarten in the country school, so was one year younger than the others in his class. He graduated with the class of 1945 with 17 students in his class.

A fondly remembered high school activity was playing on the basketball team for three years. In Dick's senior year, his team finished their season with a 29-3 record. The players averaged 6 feet in height which was rather tall for that time.

School memories also include an English teacher, Miss Fritz, and of course Bernice Scott, the stern principal. Bernice ruled with an iron fist and was quite the disciplinarian. Dick also shared that although Bernice was known for her tough exterior, she would help students on the side.

As a teen, Dick recalls detasseling corn for Pioneer, caddying at Hyperion Golf Course and doing fence repair for the Meredith Dairy Farm. The Meredith Mansion and the dairy farm were west of Beaver Ave and south of Meredith Drive. St. Mary of Nazareth Church owns the mansion today.

After Dick graduated from Johnston in 1945, he joined the Army at the age of 17. His mother had to sign permission for him to join the Army. He served in WW II for two years, then returned to his Johnston home. He first worked at a gas station in Beaverdale across from the Save Way Grocery Store where a young Betty Jean Ferguson worked with her parents in their family owned business.

Jean remembers working in the store at the age of 12 and continued working there until they sold the grocery store in 1952. Interestingly, there were 7 grocery stores in the Beaverdale area. Most of them were locally owned, but a couple were chains, such as the A & P and Thriftway.

Jean and her family lived in the Oak Park neighborhood while growing up. The Oak Park area is west of 6<sup>th</sup> Avenue in Des Moines. She attended North High School which was then located at 7<sup>th</sup> and College. While working at her family grocery store, a young man by the name of Dick Mott, working across the street at the gas station, began to notice a good looking girl who walked past their station. Since Dick was not good at whistling, a man by the name of Ray Aller, who worked at the station would “wolf whistle” at her when she went by. When she looked in that direction, she would see only Dick. Well, they eventually got acquainted, and as they say, the rest is history.

They remember with fondness their first date at the Tromar Ballroom at 5<sup>th</sup> & Park in Des Moines. They often went to dances and movies while dating.

His mother once again had to sign permission for him to marry Jean in January, 1949. He was 20 years old, and the requirement for males was 21. They lived in Dick’s grandparents’ house while his grandparents went south to Arizona. They built their own house in Johnston by hand in 1952.

When Jean’s parents sold their grocery store in 1952, Jean found employment at Sanford & Company located in the Des Moines Building. Her position as an office manager kept her busy until she retired in 1960.

In May of 1960, Jean and Dick had the fortune of adopting their son, Larry when he was 8 months old. Again in 1962, they were blessed with a sister for Larry. This new little bundle of joy was only days old when they adopted her. They named her Linda. They now had the “perfect” family.

Once the children were in school, Jean went back to work, this time working for Sellner Oil Company here in Johnston. She later worked for Polk County offices from 1980 in various positions, retiring from the auditor’s office in 1993.

Dick began working for Ilitis Lumber in Johnston and worked there for 35 years. After the lumber company closed, Dick worked several years for American Concrete. Later in life, he drove a school bus and retired as recently as 2010.

Both Jean and Dick have done much volunteering in the Johnston community. Jean volunteered for 17 years helping 3<sup>rd</sup> graders at Lawson School. Her other volunteer work has included Luther Park auxiliary, working the election polls and Johnston senior board. Jean also taught Sunday School for many years. They both have done much volunteering in their church in one capacity or another.

She served as a prosecuting attorney in the Department of Justice until moving to the quad cities in October of this year. She is making her home in Davenport but working in Rock Island, IL. This has placed her closer to her parents.

Jean and Dick lived in the house they built in 1952 until April 2013 when they moved into a new senior development in Johnston. They love their new apartment. Dick no longer has to shovel snow or mow grass and can even park his car underground at the apartment complex.

Sitting on the front porch of the Johnston Historical Museum are descendants of John and Mary (Friar) Bauman who originally built the home in 1902. The Bauman's daughter, Laura Garlock inherited the house in 1922. Laverne and Shirley Simpson purchased the house in 1955 and donated it to the Johnston (Station) Historical Society in 2002, to be used as a museum to house the history of Johnston.

While attending a family reunion at the Simpson Barn on September 28th, the descendants of the Bauman family requested a tour of the Johnston Historical Museum. Marilyn Bauman Finney shared some information about the house. Her father, Carl, who was a son of the Baumans, had a bedroom where the Pioneer room is located on the second floor. His sister, Carrie, had the back bedroom where the attic door is and she would sneak upstairs to the attic to read her book when she was suppose to be sleeping. The Baumans had a bedroom upstairs until they moved downstairs to the room that is now the office. The school room was the kitchen and had a large table in it. There was a sink at the back door where the men could wash up before eating. There was a stairway from the kitchen to the upstairs. The computer room was the bathroom and all other rooms one the first floor were as they remain today.


Both are quite knowledgeable of all aspects of our work at the museum, and we value their input on decisions. Their willingness to help in all areas is most valuable.
